Unit was posted to Radom as quick reaction force (QTF) for convoys transiting main supply route (MSR) between Lublin and Lodz.

Radom Motorized Reserves of the Citizens' Militia (ZOMO)

B Company, 101st Guards Pioneer Battalion, 6th Guards Motor Rifle Division

Not present during battle. Presence in Radom was unknown until brief contact during movement through the city. Interrogation of captured personnel from Detachment 55 indicates that this is a detail of 28 combat engineers and 10 unskilled laborers assigned to prepare a permanent base for a company-sized (expandable to battalion-sized) Soviet presence in Radom. Selected site is former workers' dormitories adjacent to the destroyed Fabryka Broni Radom arms factory. Preparation work is ~50% complete, with target completion date of 15 October.

This unit has been coordinating with both C-126th Reconnaissance and Detachment 55. Several surviving personnel of C-126th Reconnaissance, including the company commander, claim personal friendships with B-101st Pioneer personnel.

Radom Prison Camp

Not involved in battle. Guard force is 16 personnel, mixed Soviet conscripts and Polish ex-ZOMO under overall Soviet command. Other Soviet units in Radom have little to no contact with this group and consider it dangerously corrupt, degenerate, and uncivilized.
